THE RENAISSANCE IN CHINA

(Address given on November 9th, 1926.)

It is a great honour to me to be invited to speak at Chatham House, which, I am told, was the residence of three Prime Ministers of England, and to address the Royal Institute of International Affairs, an Institution devoted to the study of problems affecting the intercourse and interdependence of nations.

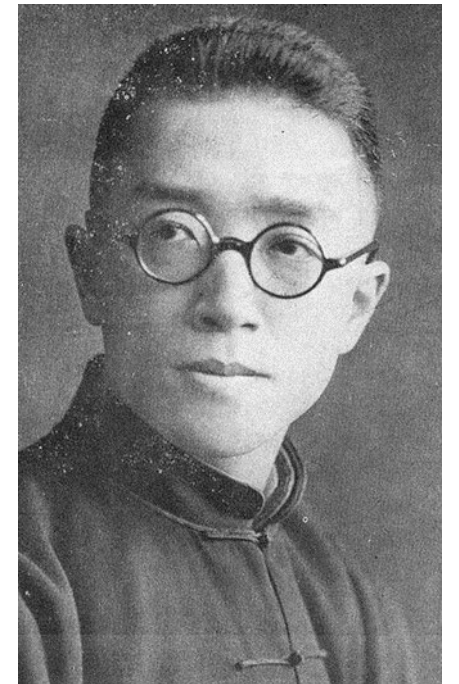
I feel a message and a mission for those Chinese and British lecturers who are to bear the responsibility of bringing the two nations together, introducing them to each other—China to the West and Great Britain to the East. It is to be regretted that Great Britain, which has been in contact with China longer than any other nation in the West, should have fallen behind some others of our neighbours in intimate intellectual relationship. It is difficult to explain the reason, but there is certainly no such close intellectual link between Great Britain and China as exists between China and America. We shall hope that the proposed exchange of lecturers, in which I am happy to have been chosen as one of the first workers, will bear fruit in creating a truer and fuller knowledge of our civilisation and our common interests.

The subject chosen for me to-night is the "Chinese Renaissance." Such a title may sound a little conceited, especially from the lips of one who has taken a personal part in this

I may say that Chinese modernisation ^{three stages has already been manifested.} ~~has~~ undergone at least three stages. THE JAPANESE OCCUPATION OF SHANGHAI:
SOME PERSONAL EXPERIENCES.⁽¹⁾

H. G. W. Woodhead, C.B.E.

When I received an invitation from your Secretary to address this gathering I felt that perhaps my personal experiences after the Japanese occupation of Shanghai would be most likely to interest you. For as my story goes on you will realize that the circumstances in which I lived after the Japanese Occupation of Shanghai precluded my keeping a detailed record of developments. For three months I was in gaol. And if any compromising documents had been found upon me it is improbable that I should have been allowed to leave Shanghai.

First I had better tell you what I was doing when the war extended to the Far East. I had been engaged in journalism in China for nearly forty years. For the three months previous to the extension of hostilities to the Far East I was editing and writing most of the articles for my own monthly review, Oriental Affairs. I was also contributing a daily column of comment, under the heading "As a Briton Sees It" to the American-owned Shanghai Evening Post and Mercury. And I was broadcasting for a quarter of an hour twice weekly on topical subjects over long and short wave, over local stations XMH and XGM at the request of H.M. Press Attache. Unlike a number of my own countrymen and Americans I had for twelve months previously regarded war in the Far East as inevitable unless Britain gained a decisive victory in the West, or America entered into a formal defensive alliance with us, and despatched a portion of her Fleet to Singapore. I felt really apprehensive when General Tojo succeeded Prince Kanoy as Premier in the latter part of October, "vested", so we were told "with powers to direct the nation toward peace or war." I did not, however, realize the imminence of war until I read the cable stating that President Roosevelt was sending a personal message to the Japanese Emperor. For I had been told by a well-informed Japanese friend, shortly after Japan joined the Axis, that at the fateful Imperial Council which sanctioned this unholy Pact,

Mr. Woodhead, formerly Editor of the Peking and Tientsin Times and of Oriental Affairs since 1933, was imprisoned by the Japanese in Shanghai for many months. He arrived in England

"As I have studied them for over thirty years," I replied, "presumably I do."

Pushing a pad of paper and a pencil in front of me he then said: "Write down all you know."

I replied that this was a ridiculous request, especially after I had been confined in a cage, tormented by vermin and with little or no sleep for several weeks.

"You are to consider yourself as a pupil and myself as your teacher" he shouted.

"My imagination does not rise to such heights."

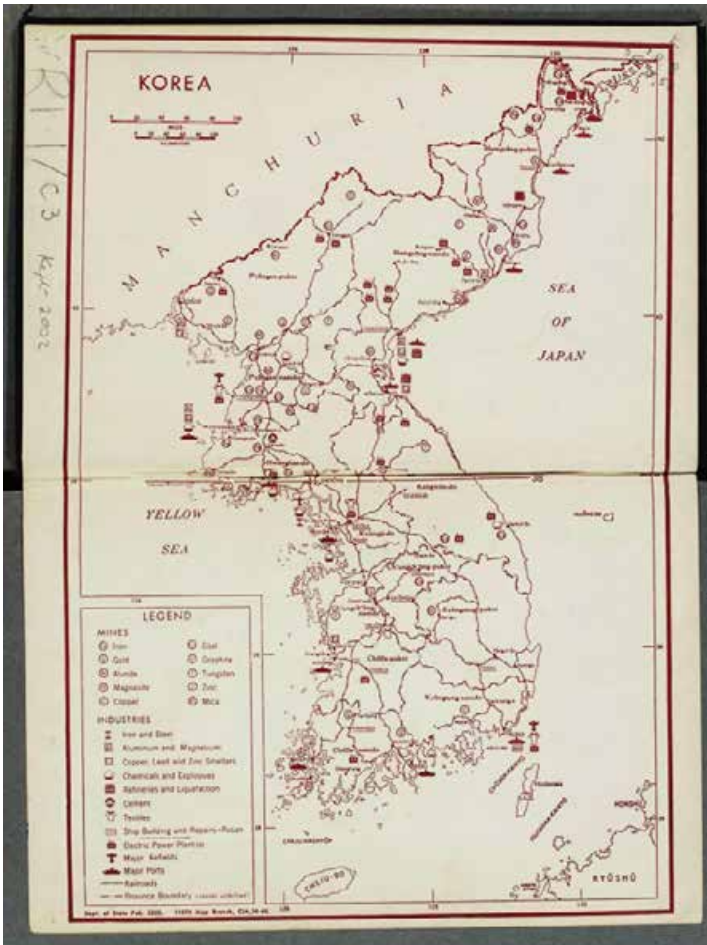
I refused to put pencil to paper and was sent back to
Next morning when I was brought up again I asked for a time

It is also, of course, quite conceivable that an improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations may take place which could probably still produce the unity of Korea. In this connection it is also possible that an improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations could commence in Korea. The fact that the "cold war" has reached an advanced form in Korea with the establishment of separate fully recognized governments does lend some logic to looking toward Korea for signs of a turning point in international relations.

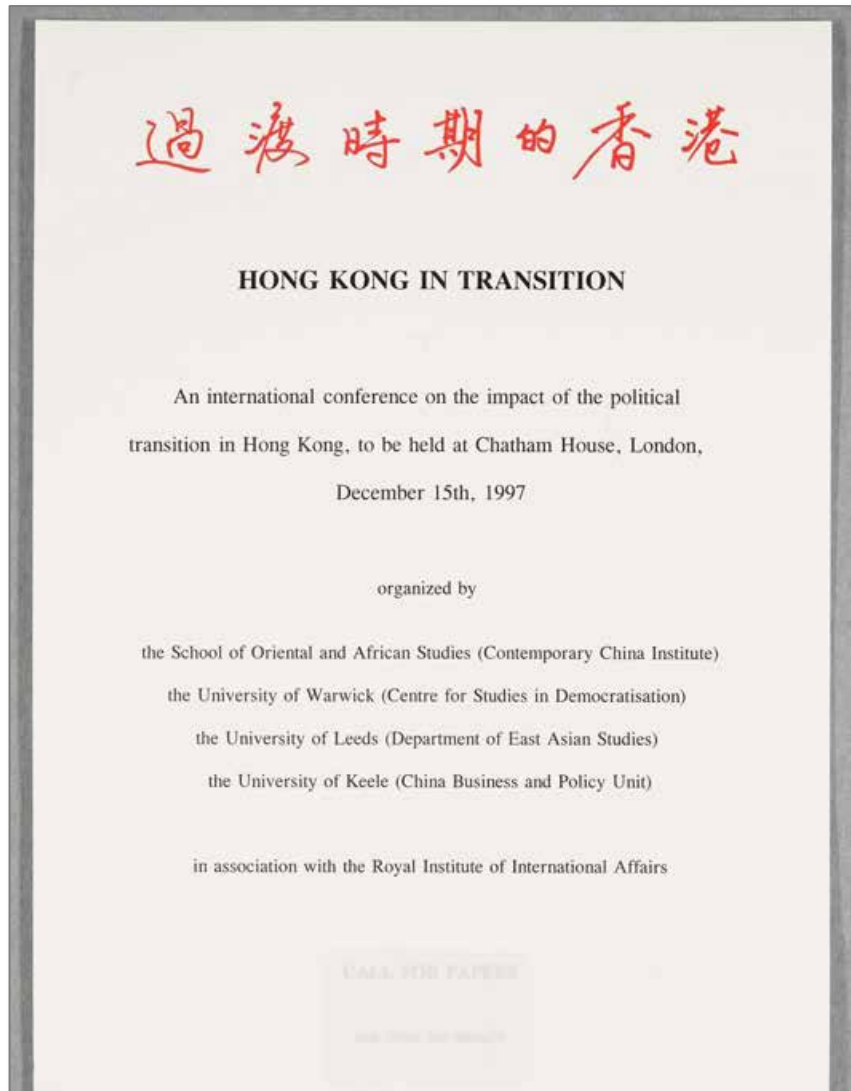

Chair: Good afternoon, everyone. I'm Pauline Neville-Jones and I'm your chairman for this session. Our theme today, which I know you are all eagerly awaiting to participate in, is "Should there be a war against Iraq." I want to say one of two things just before we begin. The first thing you will notice is that one of the people on the platform is not the name you expected. Geoff Hoon is making a statement in the House just about now and Bernard Jenkin, obviously as Shadow Defence Secretary, is replying. So we have his position taken, more that adequately I have to say, by Julian Lewis who is a member of the shadow defence team and has got a longstanding interest in defence affairs. What I thought we might do, ladies and gentlemen, before I ask the speakers to give us a snapshot of their views is just to suggest to you how we might conduct the debate this afternoon. Before we get to that stage, I'm going to ask you to vote and I'm going to ask you to do that now, then I'm going to introduce our speakers and ask them to speak and then we will have a vote at the end, and we will see whether you know we have a society of closed of open minds (*laughter*). Now, I haven't warned Heather of this but, Heather, somebody has actually got to try and take a sort of quick grasp of where the hands go so if I can have a volunteer, perhaps one or two people to help her so we get some sort of fix on the kind of numbers of people in both directions that would be really helpful.
